

Set in 412 BC, Sicily, thousands of captive Athenian soldiers begin to recite lines from the plays of Euripides, and the line between enemy and friend begins to blur.

Dinnseachas: The Lore of Places - Kerry

Dinnseanchas – seo tionscadal ar cuireadh tús leis dornán blianta ó shin le nasc a chruthú idir scríbhneoirí Gaeilge Gaeltachta as Éirinn agus scríbhneoirí Māori na Nua-Shéalainne chun iniúchadh a dhéanamh ar an dinnseanchas: miotais, an tírdhreach, an béaloideas agus an stair choilíneach atá coitianta inár gcultúir éagsúla agus mar a thagann na gnéithe sin chun cinn ina saothar cruthaitheach scríbhneoireachta. Dinnseanchas is a project inspired by the lore of places, bringing together writers from Ireland and New Zealand to delve into powerful connections between our cultures, landscapes, mythologies and colonial histories. Beginning in 2021, this project has so far commissioned six writers to share their practice and develop new work. This is the third phase of the project, and will feature work created by Micheál O Ruairc and Brid Ní Mhorain. In partnership with Ealaín na Gaeltachta, Cló Iar-chonnacht and WORD Christchurch.

We are delighted to welcome three brilliant poets to the stage.



Scott McKendry's debut, *Gub*, is noisy, dark and witty. Rooted in the language of working-class Belfast, and slipping between eras and time zones, these poems examine generational trauma, social decay and the rituals of a place with a fraught history and an uncertain future.

Erika Meitner's sixth collection, *Useful Junk*, is part travelogue, part dream journal and part epistle. Exploring memory and desire, these poems affirm that we are made of every intimate moment we have ever had, and that our desire is what keeps us alive.

Our posters have represented many talented and unique artists and illustrators over the years as you can see from the selection above. This year we're delighted to have artwork by Miriam de Búrca. Miriam will have her first Galway solo exhibition in Galway Arts Centre 15 July- 26 August, curated by the centre's director, Megs Morley.

About Miriam de Búrca

Miriam de Búrca studied Fine Art at Glasgow School of Art and the Ulster University, Belfast where she received an Award of Excellence for a practice-based PhD in 2010. She is represented by the Cristea Roberts Gallery, London. She lives and works in Galway, Ireland.

The artwork we have chosen for the 2024 festival is from a series of deBúrca's work titled Cillíní. Of this work, Miriam has said: Cillíní were unofficial burial grounds dotted throughout Ireland, used for interring unbaptised babies and others 'considered unsuitable' for consecrated ground. The physical manifestation of these sites echo the dark recesses of the human psyche; parts of our individual and collective selves which we would prefer to keep out of the light, away from scrutiny. But if you do start to look, you begin to realise that they are everywhere: in the corners of familiar fields, on hilltops, in bogs and forests, on cliff edges, on the outskirts of towns, by the side of the road, under car parks and in suburban gardens.

Drawing on O'Brien's time on two marine expeditions in the Atlantic Ocean and Galway Bay along with archives of Irish scientific work that has sought to map, understand, and vision these marine ecosystems, *draft fissure* brings together a range of media, including sound and visual installations, to reorient extractive imaginaries of ocean ecosystems, and attune to networked oceanic knowledges and communities – and their unfathomable elements – amongst the unfolding of climatological emergency. 




