Working together for a decade, Benjamin de Búrca (b. 1975, Munich, Germany) and Bárbara Wagner (b. 1980, Brasília, Brazil) are artists that produce films and video installations featuring protagonists engaged in cultural production as forms of resistance.

'Set to go' by artists Benjamin de Búrca and Bárbara Wagner, takes its title from 'Faz que vai' the name of a Frevo dance step from Pernambuco in Brazil. This dance step feigns a moment of imbalance where the body lurches forward only to stop on its heels, arms Bhéal Feirste – greanach, dian, agus i nGaeilge!

This one-man show delves deep into the world of compulsive gambling, to produce cathartic results. Gritty, intense and in Irish, this new play is written by Naoise Ó Cairealláin, award-winning rapper Moglaí Bap from KNEECAP.



'A collection of almost sublime purity' is how the *Dublin Review of Books* described Vona Groarke's *Selected Poems*, a book which surveyed her first two-and-a-half decades of published work. Her most recent book is *Hereafter*. *The Telling Life of Ellen O'Hara*, a blend of poetry, fiction and history that reflects on the life of an emigrant Irish woman in the latter part of the nineteenth century.

Colm Tóibín described the new book as 'a groundbreaking way of investigating a traumatic period in history, not only Irish history, but American history too.'



At once intellectual and accessible, moving and experimental, and combining a linguistic innovation with a deep emotional rooting, *RENDANG* (2020), the first collection by London-based poet Will Harris, won the Forward Prize for Best First Collection and was shortlisted for the T.S. Eliot Prize. His second book of poems, *Brother Poem*, was published by Granta in the UK and by Wesleyan in the US in March 2023.

Rachael Allen's highly-anticipated debut collection, *Kingdomland*, was published by Faber and Faber in 2019 and marked the arrival of a significant new voice in British poetry. Lauding *Kingdomland* in the *Sunday Times*, Jeremy Noel-Tod said you mustn't 'be fooled by this book's bright orange jacket: it's not cheerful, it's on fire'. Take this rare opportunity to learn from the internationally-acclaimed short story writer, essayist and critic Carmen Maria Machado, author of *Her Body and Other Parties* and *In the Dream House*. In this talk, you will explore the craft of writing fiction that doesn't move fiction contained in a single, discreet space as large as a house, and as small as a bed—and the implication it has for our understanding of gender, characterisation, plot, and time.

Bad Bridget: Crime, Mayhem and the Lives of Irish Emigrant Women is the astonishing product of years of meticulous work in various archives by leading historians Elaine Farrell and Leanne McCormick. It tells the stories of Irish women who sought new lives in North America becoming involved in crime of all sorts: from crimes of passion and opportunity, to calculated and daring acts of transgression. Despite its basis in thorough academic research, it is an accessible work that became an instant best-seller in Ireland.

Acclaimed poet Vona Groarke's most recent book is *Hereafter*. *The Telling Life of Ellen O'Hara*, an innovative blend of poetry, fiction and history that reflects on the life of her great-grandmother, an emigrant Irish woman in the latter part of the nineteenth century. Machado writes beautifully about contemporary horrors, touching on queer and feminist issues with a revolutionary, eclectic style that has made her one of the most influential writers today.

Cúirt is delighted to welcome Suad Aldarra and Derek Owusu to discuss the meaning of home, the importance of belonging and the challenge of pushing borders and boundaries. Suad Aldarra's debut memoir, *I Don't Want to Talk About Home*, is the captivating story of how she was forced to flee war-torn Syria in 2012, as well as a moving reflection on the struggles of building a new life in Ireland.



In his latest novel, Losing the Plot, Derek Owusu, driven by a deepseated desire to understand his mother's life before he was born. offers a powerful imagining of her journey from Ghana to the UK, and how she navigated parenthood in a strange and often lonely environment, to interrogate how the effects of displacement are felt across generations. Told in a genrebending, impressionistic style, Owusu explores the pain of migration and the importance of telling stories, to others and ourselves, in hopes to make sense of them.

Bay Views: Writers on Wild Swimming with Chantal Thomas, Emily Hasler and Vanessa Earl in conversation with William Keohane Saturday 22 April | 12:30 | €10/€8 An Taibhdhearc

Writers and swimmers Chantal Thomas, Emily Hasler and artist and swimmer Vanessa Earl will be joined in conversation by William Keohane, as they dive into the connections between swimming and creativity, wild bodies of water, and writing.

Chantal Thomas's memoir, *Memories* of *Low Tide*, recounts a visit to her mother, a life-long swimmer, in a coastal town in France. Thomas embarks in a journey of self-discovery



through the exploration of her surroundings, maritime geography, coastal culture and swimming. Emily Hasler's latest poetry collection, Local Interest, tackles the rapid changes of rivers and landscapes as they face natural and manmade threats. These poems explore the south Suffolk and north Essex landscapes, and the connections between the permanent and the ephemeral, in both nature and life, in a world that feels at the brink of disaster. Vannesa Earl is currently working on a multidisciplinary collaboration called SALT, between the swimming community of Galway, musician Robbie Blake and poet Mary Madec, that celebrates our connection to the sea.

Caroline O'Donoghue's Every Gift a Curse, the final book in the acclaimed, dark fantasy trilogy All Our Hidden Gifts, follows Maeve in her final attempt to defeat the Housekeeper and save her hometown, in a magical



adventure filled with tarot, romance, parallel dimensions, and an evil farright group who threaten everything.

Catfish Rolling, Clara Kiyoko Kumagai's debut novel blends magical-realism with Japanese myth and legend, in a story about Sora, a teenage girl, who's quest to rescue her mother in the aftermath of an earthquake, leads her to places unknown, where time distorts and the unhuman exists.

Adiba Jaigirdar's upcoming novel, *The Dos and Donuts of Love*, is a funny, contemporary romance that follows Shireen Malik, as she participates in a reality-TV baking show. Shireen is willing to give it all to win and help her parents' donut shop get noticed, even if it means competing against her exgirlfriend, Chris.

Donal Ryan's *The Queen of Dirt Island* is a story that explores the challenges of the Aylward women as they make their way in a rural community in 1980s Ireland. Ryan has crafted a powerful story about love, grief and the bonds that last generations. In Wendy Erskine's latest collection of stories, *Dance Move*, Belfast comes to life with colourful and complex characters. Erskine's characters and stories are at times funny and devastating, and explore the kind of wisdom that can only be found by looking at the ordinary through new eyes.

RISE and Fala da Terra: Film Screening Saturday 22 April | 16:30 | Free Nuns Island Theatre

Galway Arts Centre in partnership with Cúirt presents a special screening of two works, *RISE*(2018) and *Fala da Terra* (2022) by artists Benjamin de Burca and Bárbara Wagner in association with their solo exhibition Set to go in the Galway Arts Centre March 10-April 22.

RISE (2018) investigates the musical universe of a community of young poets, rappers, and singers who meet weekly at a community center in Scarborough, on the outskirts of Toronto, Canada. *RISE* – acronym for "Reaching Intelligent Souls Everywhere" – is a movement created by the Canadian poet Randell Adjei around the practice of spoken-word, which since 2012 organizes meetings where poetry and music are used to share stories and personal experiences.

Fala da Terra (2022) (Voice of the Land). This work features the practice of Coletivo Banzeiros, a theatre group composed of members of the Movimento dos Trabalhadores Rurais Sem Terra (Landless Workers' Movement). The organisation has been fighting for for land reform and against social inequities affecting rural workers in Brazil for forty years.





Poetry Reading with Eva Bourke, Tara Bergin and Padraig Regan Saturday 22 April | 18:30 | €12/€10 An Taibhdhearc

Eva Bourke, is the author of seven poetry collections, most recently *Seeing Yellow* (2018), in which the poet offers empathy and historical awareness through illuminating and honest language. The Irish Times described Eva's poems as suggesting 'that the soul is an enduring gentleness in us, in others, in perhaps everything, and that it needs us to release it, to let it breathe, to nourish it with what we create rather than destroy.' Eva is a member of Aosdána.

Tara Bergin's third collection Savage Tales brings the riddle, song and dialogue together to form a series of formally inventive, blackly comic



sequences that are both compelling and puzzling. These poems 'seem to quiver with a strange, uncanny sense that something is always about to happen' notes The Poetry Society. Tara Bergin's second collection *The Tragic Death of Eleanor Marx* was shortlisted for the T. S. Eliot Prize.

'To look up from Padraig Regan's words is to find oneself gently refitted into the world' is how Anthony Capildeo describes the work in the Forward Prize shortlisted *Some Integrity*. This collection redefines the Irish lyric tradition, weaving art, food, desire, and the porous and provisional nature of our bodies together into playful and philosophical poetry.



the Booker winning *The Gathering*, and more recently, *The Green Road* and *Actress*, Anne's elegant and scrupulous voice transports us through funny, bleak and engrossing literature.

Louise Kennedy's work has been described in the *Guardian* as 'salty and wise', as holding a rare quality in fiction, 'a sense of utter conviction'. From her debut short story collection The End of the World is a Cul de Sac, to her novel Trespasses (Novel of the Year 2022 - An Post Irish Book Awards), Louise's sharp and vivid writing gives us tender, authentic stories.

Join Anne and Louise in conversation with Glenn Patterson, as they discuss the themes that compel them, and share their experiences of writing.





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
