Saturday and Sunday of the festival there is a continuous screening of 'v.', Channel 4's recording of Tony Harrison's acclaimed poem. In the video the poet's narrative is intercut with documentary and dramatised sequences as Harrison visits his parents' grave to find their tombstone and others disfigured by the graffiti of passing football supporters. POETS-IN-SCHOOLS

Cuirt will co-ordinate three poets - Michael Ó Siadhail, Mary O' Malley and Moya Cannon to visit schools in the Galway Region on Thursday and Friday, April 13th and 14th.

THE POETS

Moya Cannon

Moya Cannon was born in Dun fanaghy, Co. Donegal in 1956. She now lives in Galway where she teaches travelling children. Over the past ten years, her work has appeared in Irish, American and (in translation) German poetry journals. She has read in a number of Festivals and is at present compiling a first collection.

CLAIRE FLEMING

Claire Fleming is a singer/harpist and has composed for harp and piano and set the poetry of W.B. Yeats and Austin Clarke to music. She has performed on RTE and has just recorded a commercial cassette of 8 poems by W.B. Yeats set to music and sung with harp, by kind permission of Michael Yeats.

TONY HARRISON

Tony Harrison, born in Leeds in 1937, is Britain's leading theatre poet. His first collection of poems, The Loiners, was awarded the Geoffrey Faber Memorial Prize in 1972. His version of Aeschylus's Orestela won him the first European Poetry Translation Prize in 1983.

"I thought from the beginning - it's got to be work. It's got to be as hard work as my father's job and as long hours". Time Out. Tony Harrison writes for the National Theatre, the New York Metropolitan Opera and for television.

MAIRE HOLMES

Máire Holmes was born in Dublin and has had poetry published in both Irish and English in various publications including 'Salmon', 'Cyphers' and 'Writing in the West'. She was a Hennessy Award winner in 1988 and the new Irish editor of 'Salmon' magazine. A collection of poems, 'Dúrún' was published in 1988.

BRENDAN KENNELLY

Brendan Kennelly, born in Ballylongford, Co. Kerry, is Ireland's leading theatre poet. His Medea, world premiered in the 1988 Dublin Theatre Festival. Other works include Antigone, 1986 and Cromwell 1987. Winner of the A.E. Memorial Prize for poetry in 1967 and, more recently, recipient of the Critics' Special Harveys Award of 1988, Brendan is currently Professor of Modern Literature in Trinity College Dublin.

MICK LALLY

Mick Lally was born in Tourmakeady in Co. Mayo. He acted extensively for An Taibhdhearc and the became a founder member of the Druid Theatre Company. Productions have included The Playboy of the Western World, The Wood of the Whispering and appropriately A Touch of the Poet. He has acted with the Abbey and the Gate theatres. Television work includes 'Bracken' and 'Roma' for which he won Jacob Awards and most recently 'Glenroe' which has made him a household name in Ireland.

GEORGE MAC BETH

The self-proclaimed "Trapeze Artist of the Abyss", George Mac Beth was born in Scotland in 1932. After reading Greats at Oxford he was until 1976 Producer of Arts for the BBC. He has published several highly praised collections of verse, fiction and autobiography and edited The Penguin book of Victorian Verse and The Book of Cats. He has travelled the world teaching, writing and reading from Budapest to Honolulu, and now Galway, his new home.

ÁINE NI GHLINN

Áine Ní Ghlinn's second collection of poetry Gáirdín Pharthais agus Dánta Eile was published in 1988 and was awarded the Duais Bhord na Gaeilge at Listowel Writer's Week. Áine is a presenter/reporter on RTE. Her latest work is due for publication in 1989 Mná as an nGnáth, winner of An Oireachtas Award in 1988.

MARY O'MALLEY

Mary O'Malley has had a variety of work published in the 'Salmon', the 'Sunday Tribune' and the 'Simon Collection'. As well as conducting workshop and readings in schools and part-time teaching in RTC Galway, she is preparing a cycle of poetry steeped in Connemara life and lore for publication shortly.

MUIRCHEARTAIGH

Aogan O Muircheartaigh was born in 1948 and works as a broadcaster with Radio na Gaeltachta. His collection of poems Oiche Ghreine, publishedby Coisceim, won him the Sean O'Riordain Memorial Prize at the 1987 Oireachtas.

MICHAEL O' SIADHAIL

Michael O' Siadhail is the author of five collections of poetry, the latest being The Image Wheel 1985. In 1982 he was awarded an Irish American Cultural Institute prize for his poetry. A specially commissioned suite of poems 'The Naked Flame' with music by Seorise Bodley was recently premiered in the National Concert Hall, Dublin. A member of Aosdana and the Arts Council, he is to be the next editor of the 'Poetry Ireland Review'.

FINTAN O'TOOLE

Fintan O'Toole was born in Dublin in 1958. He was editor of 'Magill', arts editor and theatre critic of 'The Sunday Tribune' and is now columnist with 'The Irish Times'. He has written a study of plays of Tom Murphy, 'The Politics of Magic' and a pamphlet for Raven Arts, 'The Southern Question'. Raven Arts is to publish his book, 'No More Heroes', on Shakespeare's tragedies, this summer.

BARRIE RUTTER

Barrie Rutter is a professional actor currently working with the RSC. He has previously for ITV, BBC and the National Theatre. With Tony Harrison in particular he has played Herod in The Mysteries, Herald in The Orestea and Silenus in Trackers of Oxyrhynchus, all at the National Theatre.

ANNE STEVENSON

Anne Stevenson, American poet born in England in 1933, is the author of eight collections of verse, including Selected Poems 1956 - 1986 published by Oxford University Press. The variety of work, serious, wry, lyrical, funny, represents 30 years of this poet's development into a leading contemporary writer.

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
