
8.30pm An Evening with Dervla Murphy & Ben Kiely



Cúirt '99's inaugural event features one of the most distinctive and adventurous talents in travel writing, **Dervla Murphy**. Murphy was born in Waterford and since 1964 has regularly published accounts of her travels, by bicycle and foot, in the more remote areas of four continents. From the Andes to India, Africa to Nepal, an evening with Dervla Murphy is a rare and special event. This evening she will discuss her work and travels with Lelia Doolan followed by a questions and answers session. Her latest book is *Visiting Rwanda*.

The "voice" of Sunday Miscellany and the last of the generation of great Irish short story writers which includes Frank O'Connor and Seán Ó Faoláin, **Ben Kiely** is a master storyteller. Born in Dromore, Co. Tyrone in 1919 he has published a huge number of collections with most recent titles including *God's Own Country - Selected Stories, The Waves Behind Us* and to coincide with his 80th birthday this year *Clay & Gods & Men*. He was elected Saoi by members of Aosdána in 1996.





Canadian short-story writer Alistair MacLeod is regarded as one of the finest exponents of short story writing. His collection, *The Lost Salt Gift of Blood* was chosen by Publishers Weekly as one of Best Books of 1988. Two of his short stories are currently being adapted for the screen.



Derick Thomson - born in Lewis in 1921. A graduate of Aberdeen and Cambridge Universities he has taught at the Universities of Edinburgh, Glasgow and Aberdeen where he is Professor of Celtic Studies. He has initiated many projects concerned with Gaelic, such as Gairm Publications and the Gaelic Books Council. Publications include An Dealbh Briste, Eadar Samhradh is Foghar, An Rathad Cian, An Introduction to Gaelic Poetry, The New Verse in Scottish Gaelic: A Structural Analysis.



Jennifer Johnston is one of Ireland's foremost writers. Her novels include *The Captains and the Kings, How Many Miles To Babylon, The Illusionist, The Old Jest* (winner of the prestigious Whitbread Prize) and *Shadows on our Skin* which was shortlisted for the Booker Prize. Several of her works have been successfully adapted for film and television. At Cúirt she will read from her recent novel, *Two Moons*.



Menna Elfynn is a political poet writing with passion for the Welsh language and its identity for which she campaigns. Along with Clarke she is one of the most prolific and significant poets writing in Wales today and her conspicuous moral and political commitments are always underwritten by her prior commitment to her native tongue. She has twice been imprisoned for Welsh language campaigns. She has recently completed a libretto for the New York Metropolitan Opera Millennium Celebrations.





Judi Benson is an American poet, born in California in 1947. She has lived in Great Britain since 1978. She regularly contributes to BBC Radio and also works as a painter. Benson has published two collections of poetry *Somewhere Else* and *In The Pockets Of Strangers* and has edited collections of poems by contemporary poets including *Klaonica: Poems for Bosnia* with Ken Smith.

Mary Dorcey & Vona Groarke


Mary Dorcey was born in Dublin in 1950. She has been active in the women's movement since the 1970s and began to write in the early 1980s. She has given many readings of her work in Ireland, Britain and Europe and her poetry and stories have been published in numerous magazines and anthologies. Her first collection of poems Kindling appeared in 1982 followed by Not Everybody Sees This Night and Moving Into The Space Cleared By Our Mothers. She has published two collections of short stories including A Noise In The Woodshed and has also been awarded the prestigious Rooney Prize for Literature.

Vona Groarke made a remarkable debut on the literary scene with her first collection of poetry in 1994, Shale. She has been the recipient of numerous awards including the Hennessy Award for Poetry, the Brendan Behan Memorial Prize and The Sunday Tribune Best New Irish Writer of the Year 1994. Other People's Houses, her new collection, will be published in April this year.

8.30pm) John Montague, Jack Mapanje & Jimmy Boyle

One of the greatest Irish poets and currently holder of the Ireland Chair of Poetry, John Montague makes his long awaited Cúirt debut. Born in Brooklyn in 1929 he spent his formative years in Co. Tyrone. He edited The Faber Book of Irish Verse in 1974 and Bitter Harvest in 1989. Works of fiction include Death of a Chieftain and Other Stories 1964 and The Lost Notebook 1987 and he has published several collections of poetry including The Rough Field and The Dead Kingdom.



VONA GROARK

Poet and political prisoner Jack Mapanje from Malawi was arrested and held captive for his anti-government stance during the Hastings Banda regime for four years during the 1980s. News of Mapanje's arrest was released to the world's media through an Irish priest and following an international campaign Mapanje was released in 1984. The Chattering Wagtails of Mikuyu Prison, Of Chameleons and Gods and his latest collection Skipping with Ropes are just three of his volumes of poetry. He is currently writer-in-residence at NUI, Cork.



Writer and sculptor Jimmy Boyle whose compelling debut novel, Hero of the Underworld, has just been published to stunning reviews and is already tipped as a Booker Prize nominee. A Sense of Freedom, his gripping 1977 autobiography was written during his time in prison in Scotland. He is best known for his sculpture and he sells to private collectors and galleries all over the world.



Vojka Djikic, Marko Vesovic & Semezdin Mehmedinovic

Writing with a political slant features strongly at this year's Cúirt. This event sees three of most respected Bosnian poets Marko Vesovic, Vojka Djikic and Semezdin Mehmedinovic, all of whom experienced the siege of Sarajevo and kept the flame of resistance alive through their writing, read at what will surely be one the highlights of the festival.

Vojka Djikic was born in Mrkonjic Grad in northern Bosnia. She was poetry editor for Sarajevo radio and tv from 1973 to the outbreak of war and works as a translator of French and Algerian literature. Her collections include *The Weaver of the Winds* and *Ash-Wednesday*.

A highly respected critic and novelist **Marko Vesovic** was born in Pape, Montenegro and has lived in Sarajevo since the 1960s. His essays and articles in the journal *Slobodna Bosnia* (Free Bosnia) appeared to much acclaim throughout the siege. Other publications include *The Forth Genius, The Founder* and *The King and the Wreck*.

Born in 1960 in Kiseljak, near Tuzla, **Semezdin Mehmedinovic** edited a remarkable wartime magazine *Fantom Slobode* (Phantom of Liberty), and was chosen to represent Bosnian writers at the 1994 Frankfurt Bookfair. One of the most outstanding poets of his generation he also wrote and directed (with Benjamin Filipovic) the film *Mizaldo or the End of Theatre* which featured in the 1994 Berlin Film Festival.





John Cooper Clarke stormed into popular cultural consciousness in the early 1980s with the albums *Zip Style Method* and *Snap, Crackle & Bop*, a volatile cocktail of rock and poetry. In the summer of 1979 he was already on the front cover of NME. Twenty years later he is still going strong. Clarke has often been unfairly pigeon holed as a punk poet and although his poems do describe a similar inner city landscape, his importance as a writer and performer stretches far beyond the finite boundaries of 70's New Wave. One of his best known books, *Ten Years in an Open Necked Shirt*, first published in 1983, remains a masterful slim volume featuring such classics as *Kung Fu International* and *I Married a Monster from Outer Space*.






Seamus Deane, André Makine & Amos Oz
